## Stresses Four- Year Plan

The last five years have brought about considerable change in the methodology of foreign languages. All of the classes use Audio Lingual Materials, which in contrast to the older, conventional method of teachIng, have the focus on speaking and understanding first, adding the other skills of reading and writing later. It should be emphasized that it is a four level program and there is considerable evidence that two years is not enough to learn to understand and speak a foreign language with any apprectable factlity.

Students are therefore encouraged to register for four years, thus preparing themselves for college. In level one, the emphasis is on speaking and understanding with few pages of reading. As he proceeds fnto levels 2,3 , and 4 , the oral skills are continued as well as development of reading and writing skills. In level 4, there is considerable emphasts on reading. All of the classes make use of a 28 position language laboratory to increase fluency of what has been started in the classroom.

## Science Offer Many

## Challenges to Students

The science department offers several different fields of study to help stimulate individual interest and activity among the ardent students. Biology, which is the study of the processes of life, begins with the simplest life forms and progresses to the most complex animals. Among the labs performed in class during the year by the student is the dissection and examination of a frog.

Chemistry is the science dealing with the composition and properties of substances, and the reactions by which these substances are formed. During this course the
student learns to use a slide rule and the application of mathematics in science.

Even more demanding of the mathematical element is Physics. During the course the student learns about the physical properties of matter, including heat, light, mass, motion, gravity, sound, changes, and interactions. While challenging to the student, Physics teaches the mechanics of everyday objects, to suggest their most advantageous uses. In Physical Science the student learns basic theories which will be helpful in his daily life.

## Girls Revise Curriculum

During 1966-67 our girl's P.E. department inaugurated a revised curriculum which has been well received. The school year is divided into nine week periods and during each of these periods three different activities are offered. Girls sign up for their choice with Seniors getting first choice, then Juniors, and then Sophomores. During a three year period each girl must take several required activities, including swimming, first aid, two team sports, and two individual
sports. She may "elect" then for the remainder of her high school days. Thus a girl may repeat one or more of the various activities depending upon the number who "elect" to take that activity.

The boys' P.E. department covered their usual activities and is looking to the future - with a possible change to a revised curriculum similar to the girls'. Because of our increased enrollment, Mrs. Dyal and Mr. Shirm were added to the departments.

## Emphasis Based on Management:

## Time, Energy, Money

Vocational Homemaking I,II, and III are courses offered girls their three years at Jefferson. A special course, Homemaking for Seniors, is designed for girls that have not had homemaking in high school and would like a little background in this subject. In all the courses emphasis is placed on the managing oftime, energy, and money as these elements are the basis for successful family life today along with learning to understand and work with people. Skills are not emphasized and the days when home economics meant cooking and sewing are gone. The areas in which the girls apply these elements are, textiles and clothing, art in the home, foods and nutrition, housing, relationships, courtship and marriage, and child care.

Vocational Homemaking has the
added advantage of home experiences and home visits. Class time does not permit each girl to develop skills which can be acquired only through practice, or to solve individual problems. She is encouraged to take these new learning experiences into her home and work with them there. This developes initiative, self-confidence, responsibility, cooperation, and other traits important to homemakers oftomorrow, Additional experience in homemaking activities are provided by FHA, Future Homemakers of America, a club national in scope and active at Jefferson High School.

Enrolling LaSalle students this year has resulted in increasing the teaching staff from two members to three. The two new members are Mrs. Duane Hastings, and Mrs. Jim Harmon.

The Drivers Education Department has begun to expand the offering of the program by adding a fourth instructor this year, Mr. Gary Kurdelmeier. The new Iowa Driver Education Law now requires that all persons who want to get a driver's license at 16 years of age must successfully complete the Driver Education Program. This affects all people whether they attend a public or parochial school that were born after August 1, 1950. Any student born after this date must enroll in and pass the course if he wants to get his license at 16. This
has meant that the department is handling an increasing percentage of the students here at Jefferson, and will also be getting some shared time students from LaSalle High School.

In addition to increasing the number of students who are able to take the course, the department has also increased the class and behind the wheel time to improve the program. With the equipment and facilities here at Jefferson we want to continue to be one of the best programs in the State of Iowa.

She is in love with Captain Ladislaus and will not have anything to do with the frustrated Count. She decides differently, however, when she is informed of her twin brother Fedor's apparent desertion from the army. Through marriage to the Count, she hopes to prevent Fedor's execution by the firing squad when he is caught. Talking to Ladislaus later, she once again changes her plans and decides to take Fedor's place at the palace. Fresco breaks the Count's monocle so that he is not aware that Irma has been replaced by Musette, a gypsy girl purchased by Capt. Ladislaus. Throughout this, the lottery ticket changes hands a number of times. Everything is finally straightened out in the end when it is revealed that Fedor is on a secret mission for the King and that the Queen has decided to call off the lottery.

The annual Jeff-Wash rivalry came next. Jeff had won five in a row, and was shooting for a sixth. The rewards were twofold; a high score would impress the pollsters, and a victory insured a dunking in the Cedar River for Coach Fisk. The game was never in doubt as the J-Hawks added march after march for touchdowns. Bob Rudd scored the first two touchdowns, on two-yard slants. Bob Kohl scored next on a 28 -yard sweep, and later on a ten-yard power. Larry Lawrence followed with an end sweep for two yards and a score, and he added a one-yard sneak for a second score. End Tim Kelley rounded out the Jeff scoring, taking a 13 -yard Lawrence pass for his fifth touchdown of the year, to take over the league lead in passes caught, and scoring. However, Jefferson defense was superior to an already great offense. The forward line of Baker, Kelley, Malmer, Blessman, Erlacher, Wilford, Norris, Kimball, Lawrence, McDowell, Rudd, and halfbacks Trickey, Witt, and Kohl held the Warriors to 1 first down in the first half, and three in the entire game. They gave up only 6 -yards passing, and 80 -yards rushing. Washington had two of the league's best backs, and the J-Hawk defense did a tremendous job on containing them. Truly a great, one-sided victory. Will next year's squad make it seven straight victories over Washington?

Iowa City came back with six seconds left in the half, when a pass brought the ball to the Jeff one-yard line. Lining up quickly, the Little Hawks beat Jeff to the punch, scoring a touchdown. The J-Hawks came out strong in the second half scoring on a 10 -yard slant by Bob Rudd. Meanwhile, the defense was holding the Little Hawks to a net 36 yards and 1 first down in the second half.

## One Davenport Ceam Beaten

West Davenport brought the number one defensive team in the conference to Kingston stadium, determined to stop the J-Hawk offense. The J-Hawks were inspired by three things: It was dad's night, East Waterloo had taken over the top spot in both polls, and Davenport Central, the next foe, had massacred Clinton the week before, 72-6. Jeff did all of its scoring in the first half, on passes from Larry Lawrence to Bob Kohl for 25 -yards, Tim Kelley for 45 -yards, and Larry Baker for 11-yards. The lone West score came on a 2 -yard plunge following a Jeff fumble.

This was a replay of the game of the year before, when Jeff had escaped in the last minute to win 20-18, for all of the marbles. Jeff kicked off, and Central began a march. After picking upthree first down, the Blue Devils were thrown for losses by a tough J-Hawk line. They punted and Jeff took over. Jeff ran three plays and picked up 36 yards. It appeared to be an offensive battle. However the Davenport line halted Jeff just short of the first down, and the quarter ended as Jeff punted. On the second play of the second quarter, little Tony Clay snuck through the Jeff line for a 49-yard gain. This broke the Jeff back, as Central then put together short gains until Clay dove in for the score with a two-yard run. Central kicked off, and Jeff took and marched to the Central 1-yard line, where Fullback Bob Simanek scored. One referee signalled the extra point good; however the head judge ruled it wide, and what could have been... wasn't. This was the way the rest of the game went as Jeff got so close, but yet not quite good enough. The game ended with Jeff on the Central one yard line and no downs left over. Central fans tore the stands apart, rejoicing in a tie. Jeff fans left the stadium disappointed.

## Mississippi Valley Conference Co-Champs




The J-Hawks ranked first in the original state press ratings and for the rest of the year, set a school scoring record with a 106-56 runaway victory over Washington, Iowa. East Moline entered the Jefferson gymnasium next, after inflicting a bitter 99-79 defeat the year before in trying to rub it in. The J-Hawks were settled with a 97-77 revenge victory for the first MVC win of the year. Cross-town rival Washington was next, and again the Jeff cagers had something to be revengeful for. Ashamed of their performance the year before as Wash went to second in the state, the J-Hawks achieved a $90-70$ victory.

The Jeff squad next encountered their only loss of the year, a heart-breaking 70-65 last minute loss to Rock Island in the large Rock Island fieldhouse. A heated game in which many things went wrong and when Jeff's great Larry Baker had his worst game of the year, a disappointing loss. The basement dwelling Dubuque Rams invaded Jeff next and put up a good fight before falling by 15 . Clinton followed the Rams in a losing effort, as did the Marion Indians. Back on the MVC trail, Jeff again atoned for the year before's loss to East Moline by a $90-73$ count. Bob Kivisto, one of Illinois greatest players, who had been averaging over 40 points a game, was held to only 28 points, as Baker hit 29 . The J-Hawks rounded out the first half of their regulation games with a 13 -point victory over Davenport West.

Next on the J-Hawk plan to the championship was a rough game with Moline, the previous two years champions, and picked to be this year's winner. The Maroons were eager to make up for their only loss in two years which the J-Hawks had inflicted in 1966. However, the Jeff cagers put together what had been called the best high school basketball game ever in defeating the Moline team on their home court. The capacity crowd gave the J-Hawks each a standing ovation as they left the game, a great tribute to a great team. The next game was probably the most heated game of the year. Iowa City came out in a deliberate attack and led throughout the first three quarters as the J-Hawks were in foul trouble. Late in the third quarter a foul was signalled on Larry Baker, everyone in the crowd feared that it was his fifth. However, the official scorer had only four and Bake stayed. "A steal and a stuff" later, and the J-Hawks were ahead to stay.

Next came one of the worst high school games ever, as cross-town rival Washington stalled the ball every chance they got. Amidst boos and various ridiculing catcalls, the Warriors were content to hold the ball for five minutes at one time without taking a shot. However, the pressing Jeff defense took its toll as they chalked up enough steals to score a 49-27 victory, holding the Warriors to no points in the third stanza. The J-Hawks simply outplayed their next three foes, Clinton, Davenport West and Dubuque, before running into a return match with Moline. This time the Maroons were fighting to regain a little pride and to also stay in the title race. The J-Hawks won in a game which went down to the closing seconds, 78-75.

At Iowa City, where the fans were pleading for a revengeful victory, the Jeff executed patterns perfectly enroute to a 10 -point victory. And then came the final stage of "Plan MVC champlonship." Rock Island had already clinched a share of the title and it was up to the J-Hawks to defeat Davenport Central towinits share. Aided by the thought of their football disappointment, the football player-dominated Jeff lineup won the MVC title share. It was a happy Gay Dahn and company which went swimming fully clothed that night. A great effort for the greatest team in Iowa history.

In the championship tilt, the J-Hawks fell behind early and quickly, as they couldn't seem to buy a basket. And as they were cold at scoring, the Ames cagers seemed equally hot as almost everything they shot was good, Before the Jeff squad woke up, they found themselves down by a $10-0$ count.

Larry Baker then sunk a free throw to open the Jefferson scoring, 12-1. Bake then added a stuff shot, and the J-Hawks seemed to come alive. They played even with Ames in a torrid pace throughout the rest of the first half, finding themselves down by 12 at the end of the first half of play, 35-23.

In the third quarter the J-Hawks seemed to rally in spurts and then sink into periods of depression as they trailed by as many as 15 in the third quarter, 54-39.

Trailing by 13 with seconds left in the third stanza, the number one J-Hawks began to display their finesse and desire. Dennis Hoelker opened the Jeff rally by stealing an Ames in-bounds pass and then passing to Trickey for a basket. Trickey then made a steal of his own, missing the basket. However, Bake was there to stuff it back in, as the clock ran out-only one period left, eight minutes to make up a 54-49 deficit.

The fourth quarter saw the state's best team in their true form as Larry Lawrence, Trickey and Hoelker led the rally that brought the J-Hawks back. Hoelker put the J-Hawks ahead for the first time in the game with 1:32 remaining, following a steal and a driving, twisting layup.

Ames brought the ball down court andstalled out the remainder of regulation time without getting a shot as the Jefferson defense was without a flaw. Leading the Jeff defense was Steve Erusha who came off of the bench to hold Ames' All-State Dick Gibbs to one basket in the last quarter and in the overtime period.

Jeff took the lead in the overtime by one point, and then fell behind as Ames scored a two-pointer. Baker added a basket to put Jeff ahead as the clock began to run down. Ames tried a hurried shot that missed, and Lawrence grabbed the rebound. He then went into a dribbling act which controlled the ball for nearly 40 seconds, being fouled with exactly 12 seconds left.

In the identical situation of a year ago when Larry missed two free throws against Washington in a losing effort. This time Larry came through, swishing both shots, giving Jeff a secure, three point lead.

Ames hurried down in the final seconds and Gibbs got his only basket of the overtime. The J-Hawks let the ball lie as the last three seconds ticked off on the clock to a 72-71 state championship victory.

Trade and Industry is designed to give practical and related instruction to students who desire to enter a trade in which they have a definite interest. Students are selected for training on an individual basis, according to their interests, desires, and qualifications for the particular occupation in which an aptitude is shown. Operation of the training course is dependent upon the training of employers to provide part-time jobs to the students. In co-operation with the school, the employer plans a schedule of work processes that will make the student proficient in as many aspects of the job as possible during the training period. Each approved trainee will make application to his prospective employer for approval.
