The group was the first Cedar Rapids high school to participate in such an event. Solo baton twirler Patti Groat and the color guard, commanded by Diane Wilson, also received Division I ratings. Seven straight half time and pre-game performances were scheduled, consisting of cogs, exploding circles, revolving diamonds and pin wheels, keeping constant movement on the field. Drum majorette Debbie Lamb led the band through its ever popular theme, the "Bud Song," much to the delight of audiences. Individual honors were bestowed upon band members Ninette June, Karen McMains, and Diane Wilson when they were chosen for the All-State Band. Jeff Weber was also selected to play in the AllState Orchestra.

## 'Ah that defense' was the phrase

 most frequently heard as fans filed out of Nile Kinnick Stadium in Iowa City after the J-Hawks gained the distinction of becoming the first team in state history to secure the prep 4 A championship. The J-Hawks had just the proper blend of offense and defense to win the coveted crown. That defense held Cedar Falls, in the first round of action, "to nothing, absolutely nothing." And it was on the Tartan turf in lowa City where that same defense got even stingier in the season's finale with Des Moines Dowling. Although Jefferson's awesome defense stole the headlines most of the season, it was the offense which accounted for the vast majority of the points.

Sometimes one special event overshadows many important goals set before regular season play begins. Such was the case of this year's exceptional varsity football squad. Landslide city victories, Mississippi Valley Conference champs, an undefeated season, and statewide recognition were just a few of the accomplishments that would have made any other team's season a success. Doing it in a convincing style, the team literally steamrolled over all its opponents. And when the season had ended that magic number had reached eleven. With the two weapons the J-Hawks possessed, it's no wonder they were acclaimed number one on both AP and UPI polls. The season was highlighted by an explosive offense that averaged a respectable 27.3 points per game and their rock-em sock-em counterparts that held every team they faced in the state to an average $\mathbf{3 . 2}$ points per game. The defense also gained the distinction of becoming the stingiest team in Jefferson's history.

Forging their way through a heap of excellent team opponents, this year's sophomore squad ended its season with an outstanding record of 7 wins and 2 losses. Led by the hurling of quarterback Fred Stoeker, and the quick speed of backs Bruce Feuerhelm and Randy Jacobson, the sophomore J-Hawks attained a 7-2 record for the fourth straight year. After victories over Davenport West, Dubuque Hempstead, and Clinton, the squad fell to a powerful Bettendorf and lowa City team in games of 14-0 and 7-6 respectively. But the soph machine pulled back into line with smashings over cross town rivals Kennedy and Washington, ending this season's drive in a 478 bulldozing of Muscatine. "Superstars?" reflected backfield coach Bob Allen. "No, we didn't have the superstars of past years, but we had the BEST allaround team in J-Hawk history!"

the '72 yearbook, the 1973 Statesman staff started off the year by choosing the "Blue Revolution" as its theme.
