






Going Strong...



















World-wide happenings and












Throughout the school




It's all in a day's work as senior Bill Reardon rechecks his measurements before making a crucial cut.


































































































From dancing to chatting, couples spent a memorable evening at the senior prom held at the Sheraton Inn.
















While most students


