## Defense leads J-Hawks

They called themselves the "Big Blue Wrecking Crew" and by the end of the season, the Jefferson football team had proved it true. The J-Hawk defense led the Mississippi Valley Conference, giving up 135 yards per game. "Defensively, we were one of the best teams ever," explained defensive line coach Bob Allen.
The offense finished powerfully, scoring 105 points in its last three games. The strong J-Hawk offense and defense led third-year coach Bill Calloway to his first winning season with a 6-3 overall record, and a $6-1$ conference loss to Washington earned the J-Hawks second place in the MVC. Coach Calloway said, "The main reason for the success of the team was the off-season weight training."
MVC honors went to eight J-Hawks. Named to the first team were Dave Simon, Chris Lien, Darrel Long, Scott Wischmeyer, and Gary Feaker. MVC second team honors went to Randy Meier, Chris Watson, and Scott Gull.
