So no matter what students choose to do after 3 p.m., they all are working to achieve one goal—to create the most memorable moments of high school.






The faculty had another great year by pulling approximately 425 seniors through to graduation, and getting an early start working with sophomores and juniors to attain their goals.






"It's a good policy because it keeps kids in school, but it's really strict," stated junior Jason Hansen.

Next year's team should be fairly deep in talent considering all the fine juniors returning, with added help from a sopho-





"I thought the season was disappointing. We had quite a few games where we came up short. I think the team thought we would do a lot better (Continued on page 74)















"This group of kids we have is


willing to make the sacrifice to improve their skills by working hard and becoming a strong club," added Kenney.


"We should have an overall fine ball team. We'll have a strong pitching staff, better overall hitting, and faster running on the bases. We should be an exciting team," commented Kenney.

The J-Hawks opened their season May 28 against LaSalle in the Metro Tournament.







Writers were often rewarded with a byline, or if a story was really well written it might have been emphasized in the new "teaser boxes". Teaser boxes were used at the top of the front page.


Alicia Ross was named the Most Valuable Staff member by Mr. Smrha. She received this honor for her excellent writing skills and her positive attitude in the classroom.






Although these two clubs didn't receive very much recognition, the overall feeling of being able to help their fellow classmates was thanks enough.





Overall, the Colorguard had a very successful season and helped highlight the Band of Blue's performances.




















Band is top rate




'Feat' is magical

















As the doors closed to the 1987 school year, many things went through students' minds. To each person this year had a special meaning.
