"The new Homecoming queen is . . . Julie Nelson."





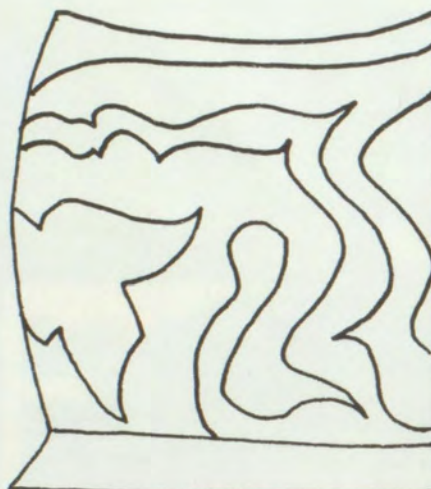
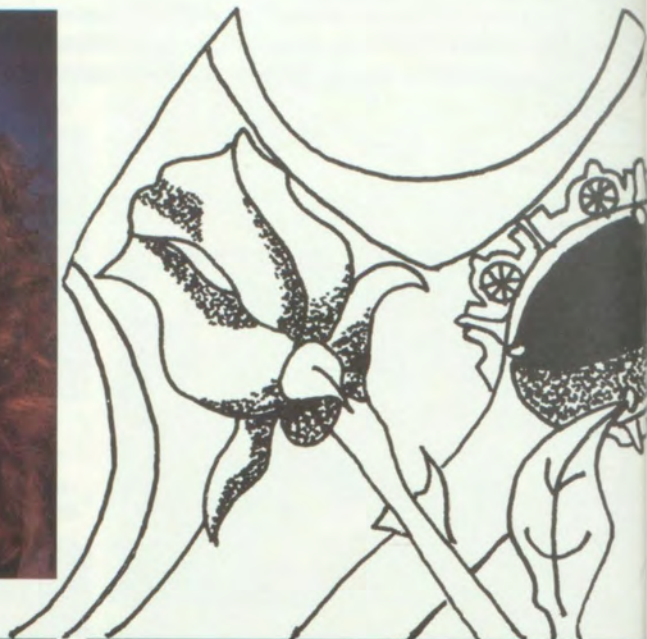

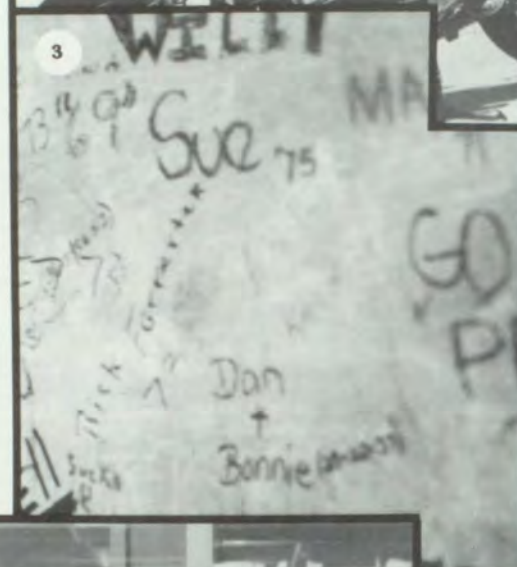

Guys take stage

"What is this dance, and why is it so controversial?" a freshman new to Jefferson asked as WPA rolled around this April 1. The dance started at Jefferson back in 1978, a time when it was a foregone conclusion that the man would always pay for dates. To help break tradition Women Pay All (WPA) was adopted at Jefferson. By rule, the girl asks out the guy, then proceeds to pay for dinner, pictures, and the dance.

Although the idea sounds wholesome, it has undergone some criticism in the late 80's, bred by a feeling of equality. Women have demanded equality, and in most cases have gotten it—except where WPA is concerned, they say.

In the April 1988 *Outlook* a letter from Ms. Mary Roberts, a Jefferson foreign language instructor, wrote, "My own school abolished Sadie Hawkins Day (a dance that girls invited guys to) when I was in 8th grade (15 years ago) because it was an outdated idea."

Still, despite scattered protest, once a year Jefferson hosts the WPA festivities, starting with a list given in homeroom of all the guys in your grade level. 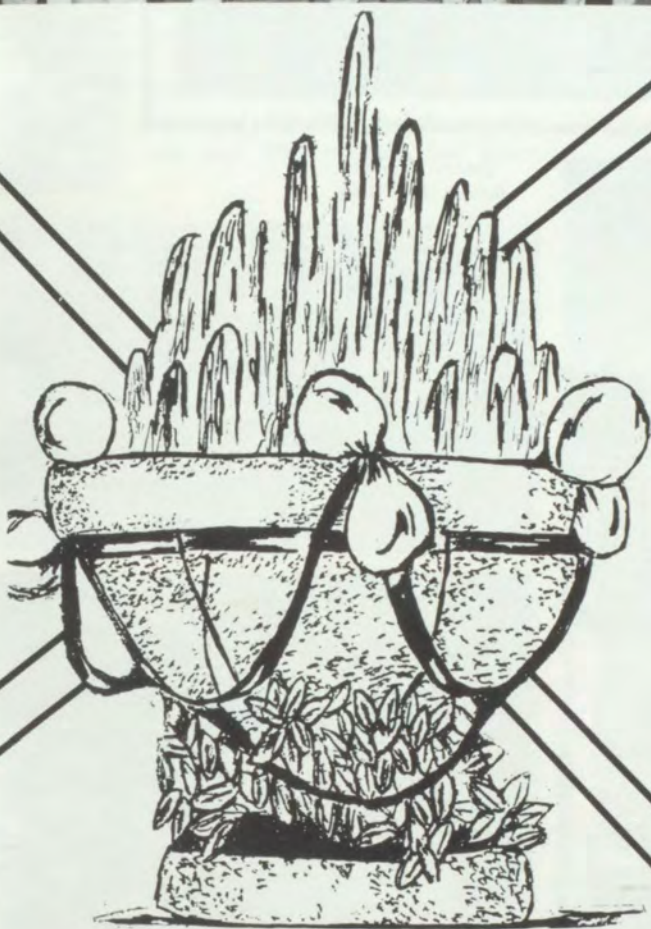
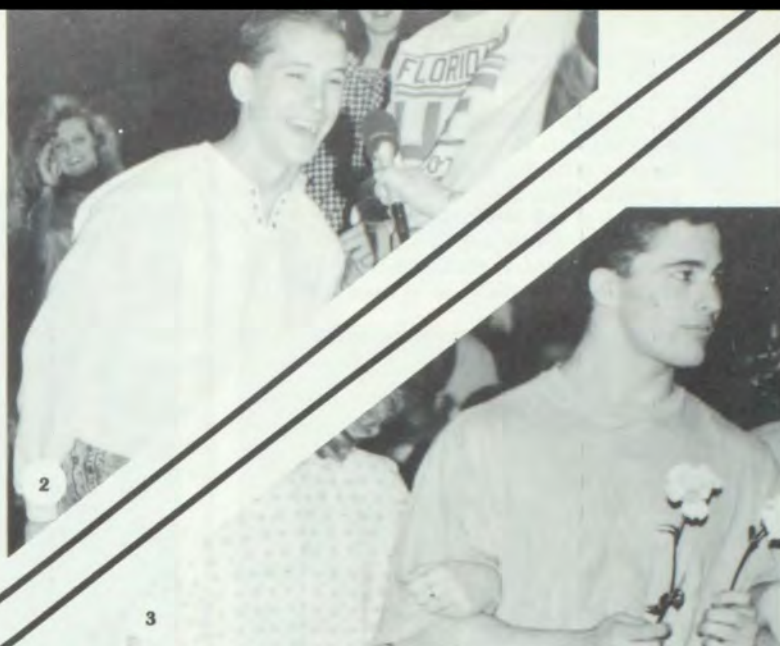

When Gwyn Godfrey, a senior,

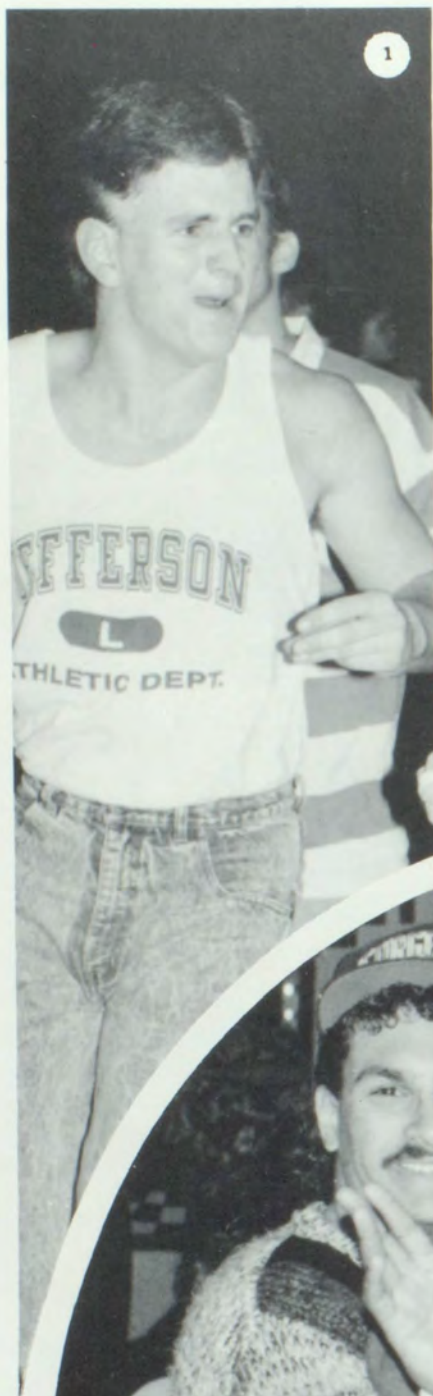

be with a group of friends. Take Jenni Popenhagen for instance. When asked about attending mixers, she answered that she goes to find the cute red-heads, like Todd Norden!

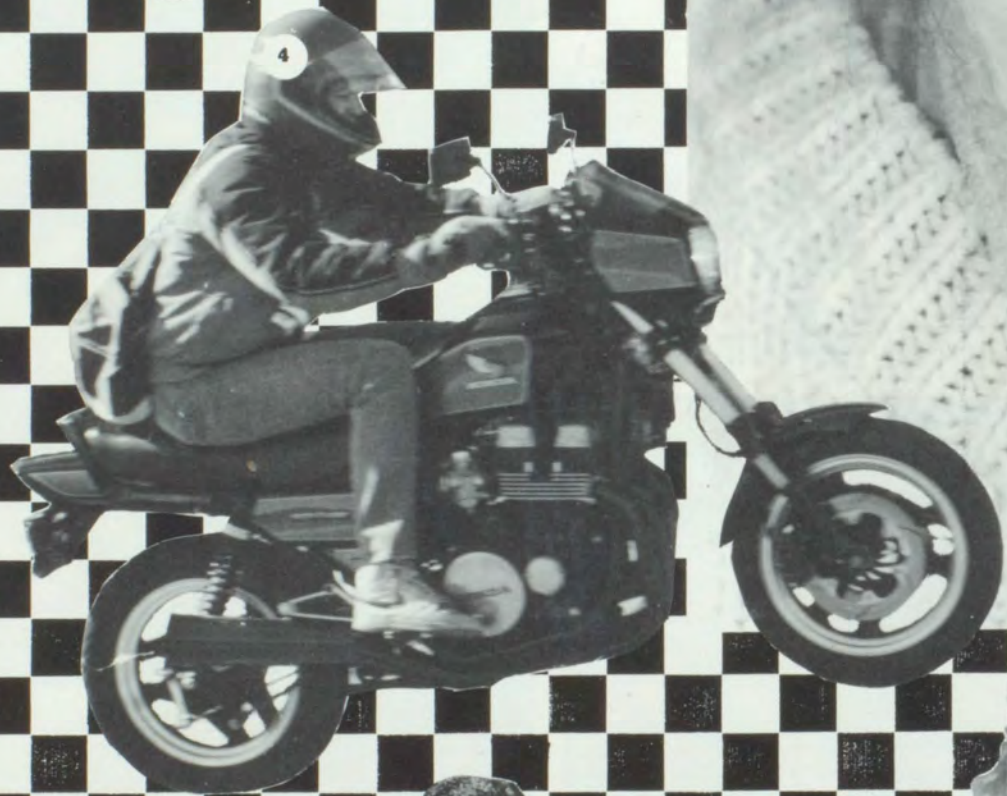
However, not everyone enjoys mixers. Terri Lodge said that she enjoys mixers depending on the music that was played and the people who attended.

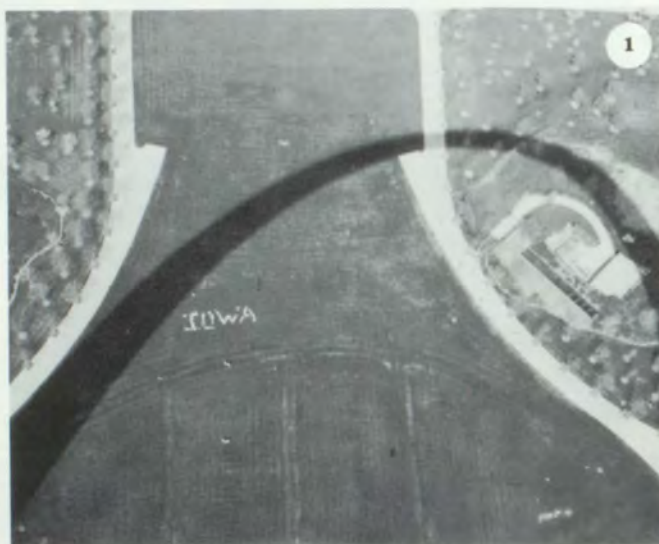


Bands share fun

the choral department since a mere three percent of the competitors take home a gold from this prestigious competition.

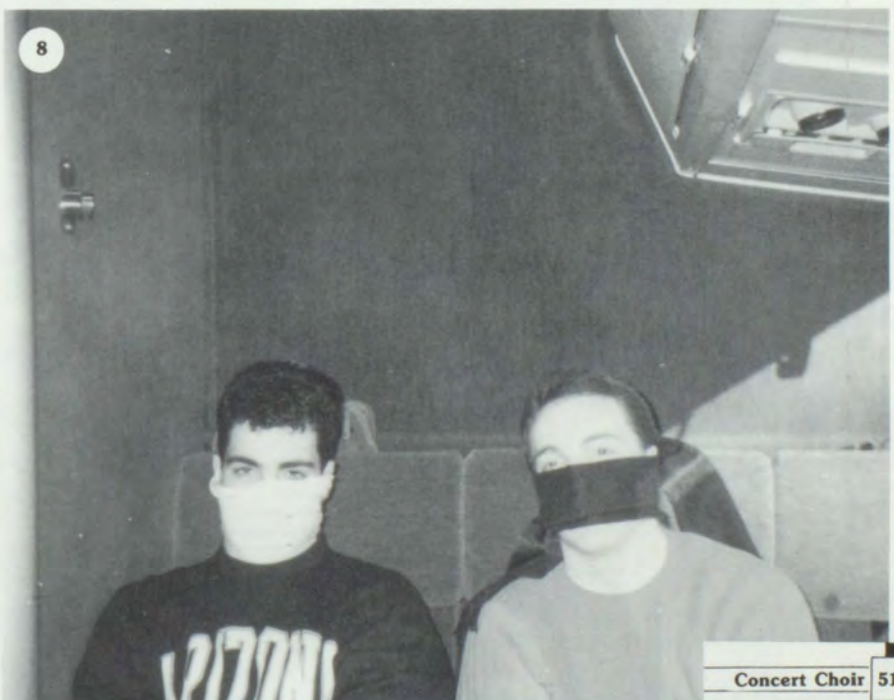

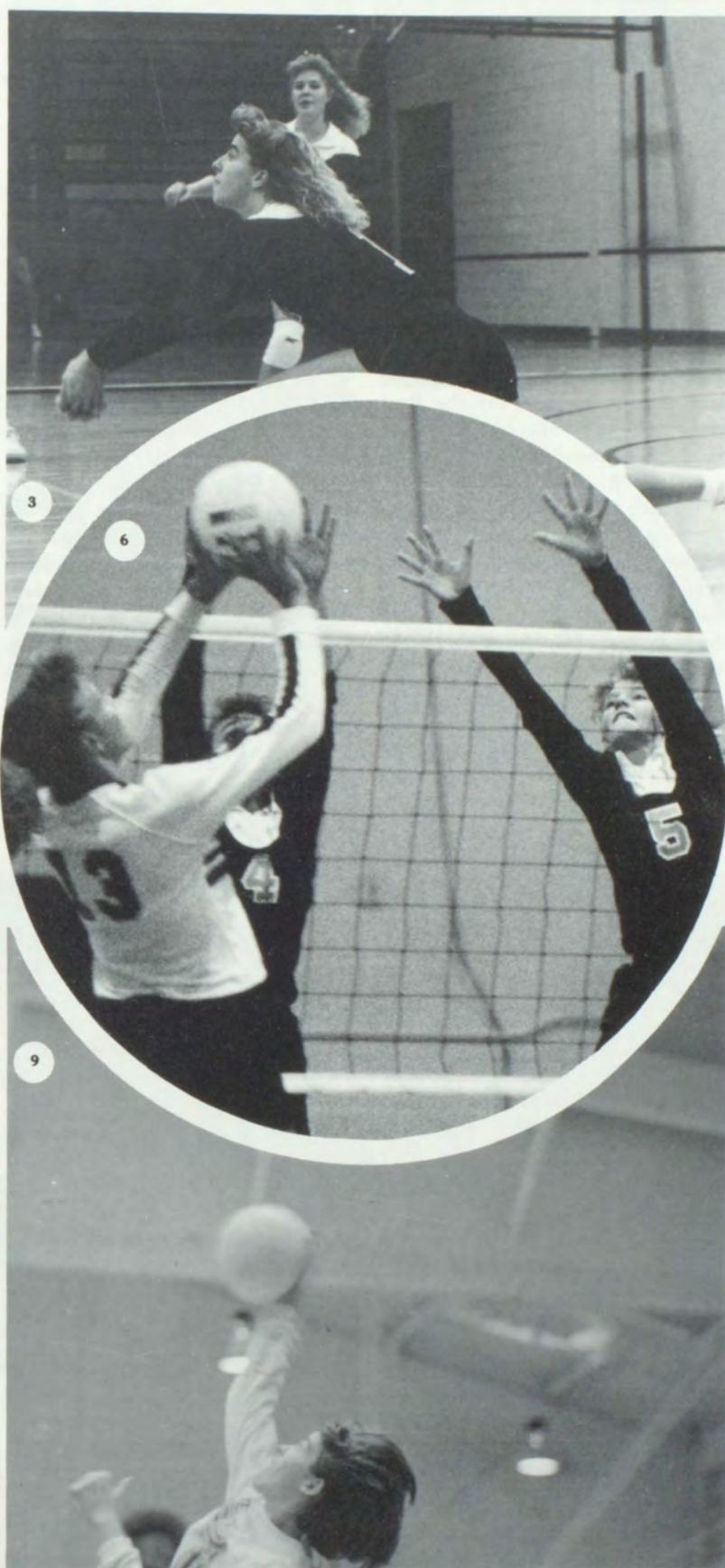

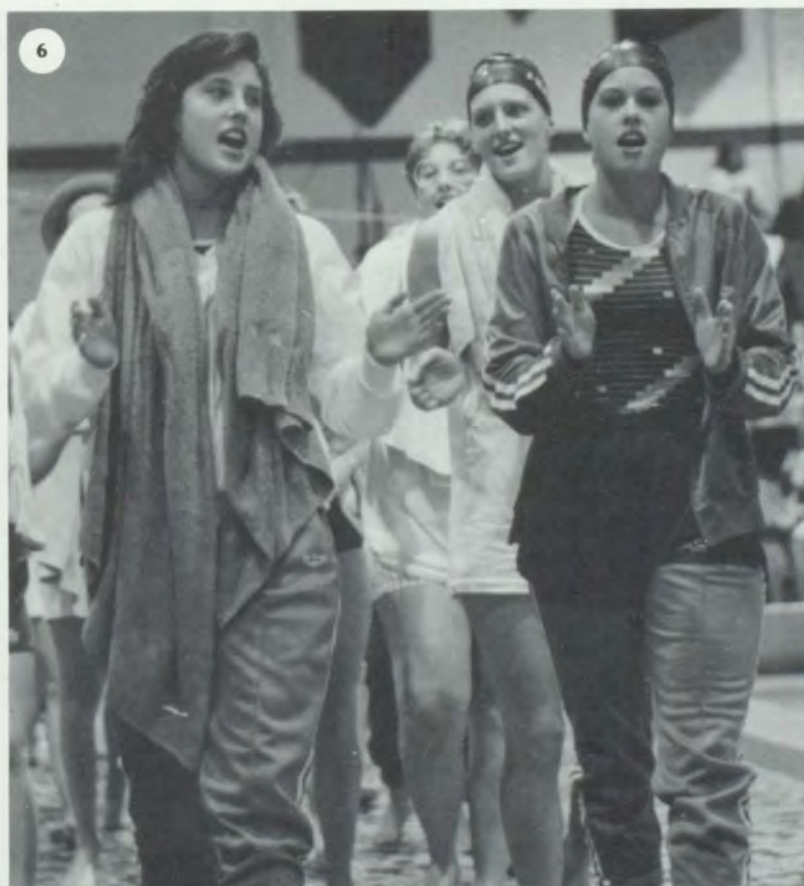
The girls finished seventh in the MVC with the sophomores earning the championship, and finishing third at the District meet. The girls took seventeenth

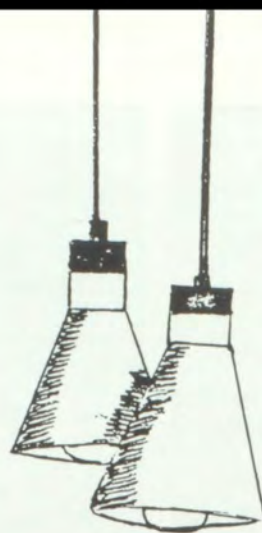

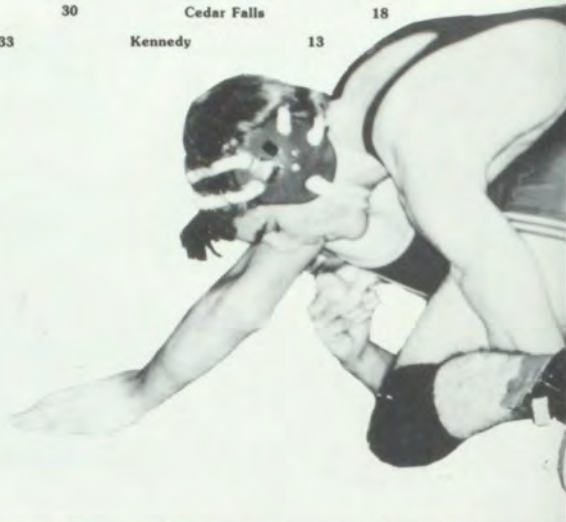

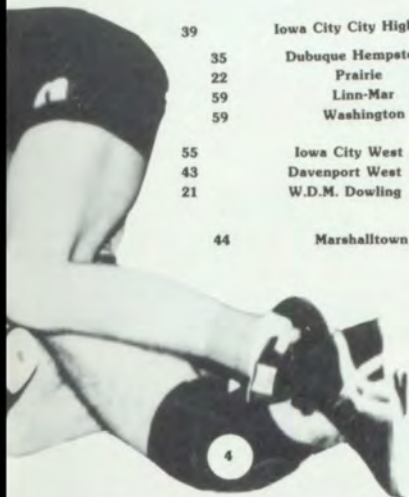
Coach Briggs reflected on the season by mentioning the bright spots. "I would have to say that having state champs, being third as a team, and winning districts was great."

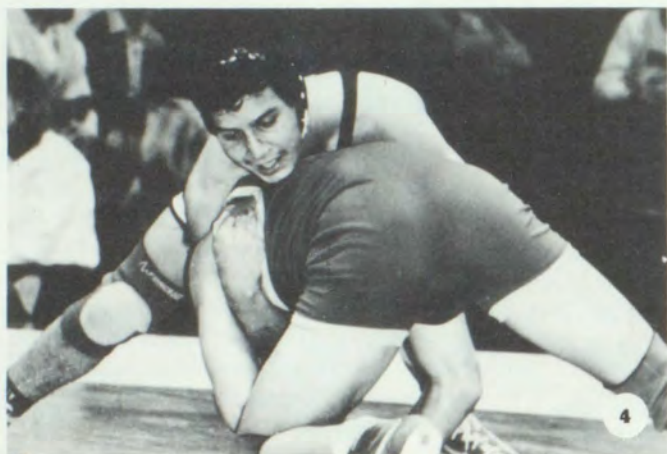

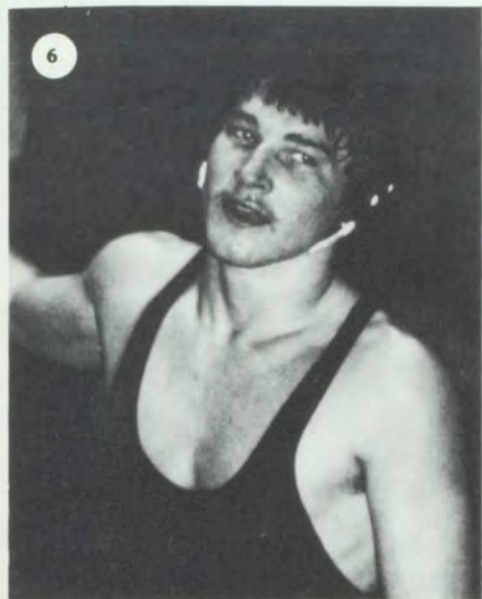
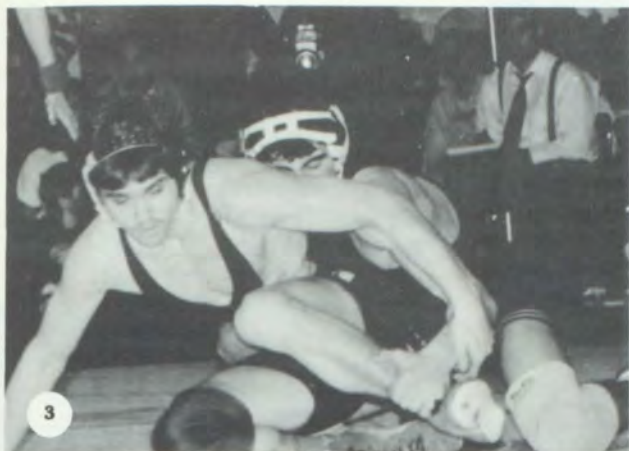

By clutching the MVC crown, the emotions of the team, as they took

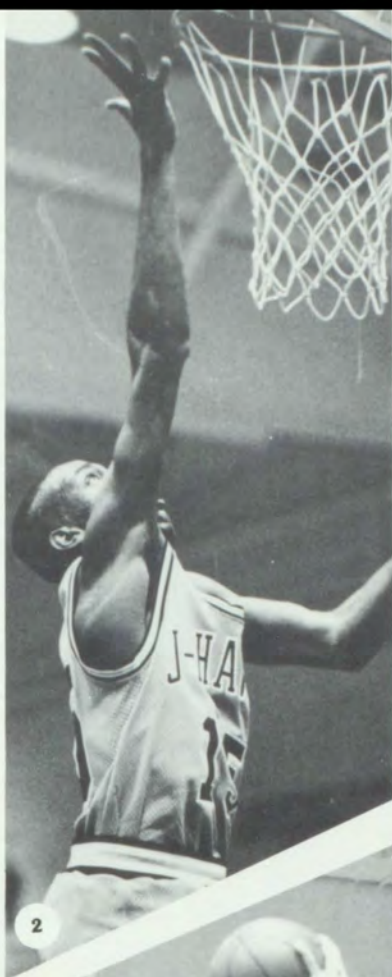
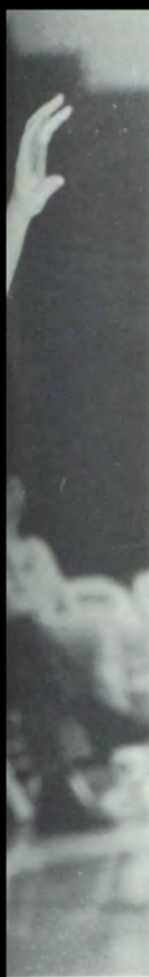

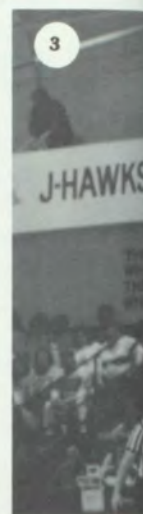

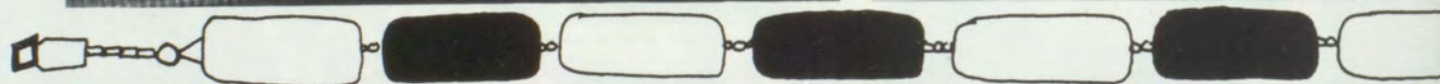

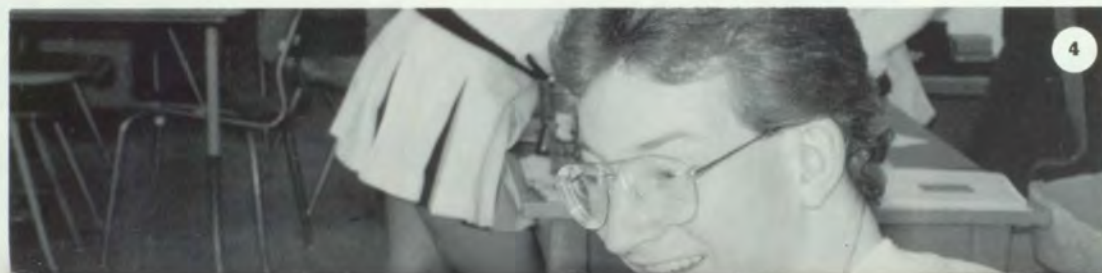

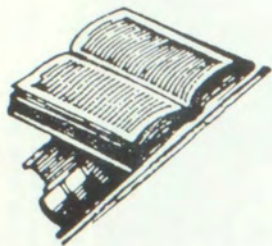

administration was another goal the Student Council realized this year. JHS Student Council sweatshirts were purchased by each member in order to present our pride in Student Council and our school everywhere we went.

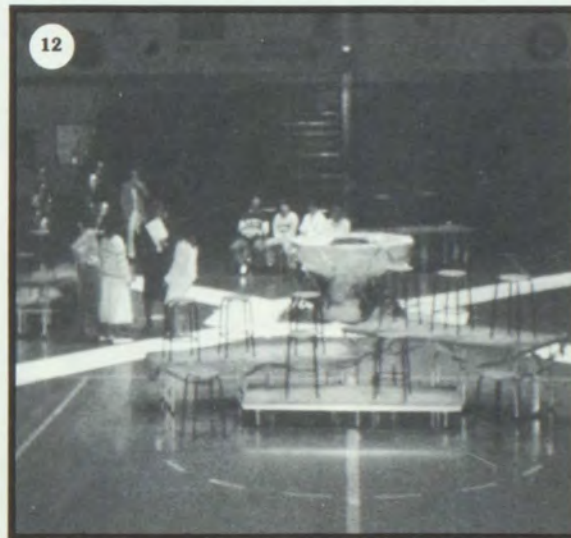
