## Students receive scholastic honor

On April 22, seventy-five students were inducted into the National Honor Society. The National Honor Society is an elite group of students who not only have excellent grades, but also show good character, leadership, service, and scholarship. Schools from all over the nation induct thousands of students every year.

To be considered for N.H.S. at Jefferson, a student must be a junior or senior and have a 3.5 G.P.A. or higher. Students who meet that requirement are then sent an application to fill out. On the application, students must show what they have done in the four above areas. A committee of teachers then considers the applications and decides who is to be inducted. Those students are then notified of their acceptance.

Senior inductee Dan Delaney remembers waiting for his acceptance letter. "It was agony. Everytime an office runner came in to one of my classes with a note, my pulse would begin to race, wondering if this was it."

The induction ceremony was the culmination of this process. The old members of N.H.S. each had a part in the ceremony. Kay Hegarty was the keynote speaker. The inductees were presented with a pin, a membership card and treated to a special reception afterward. The inductees will also have a special honor cord to be worn at graduation.
